Vulnerabilities:

- Interpersonal and trust-based relationships among individuals

- Expense in terms of human resources, social capital

- As community objectives evolve, outreach strategies evolve








Metaphors of Resilience


What does the concept of resilience offer us?

- -Partnership and resilience aren't characteristics, or static
 - -but dynamic, adaptive, **human** processes
 - -enmeshed with cultural contexts

- -which makes them resource-intensive
- -and often at odds with institutional constraints

What questions does *resilience* spark?

-From a community partner's perspective, where are you in this model?



-How do we draw people from the outside in?

What questions does *resilience* spark?

-How can we make our partnerships resilient...

to technical change, structural violence, the loss of individual allies, community and institutional shifts?

- -Beyond "use", what are your stakeholders' real objectives? How does your work enable or constrain theirs?
- -Where do communities appear in your workflows?
- -Are standards and workflows adaptable? How are they intentional about the humanity of processes?
